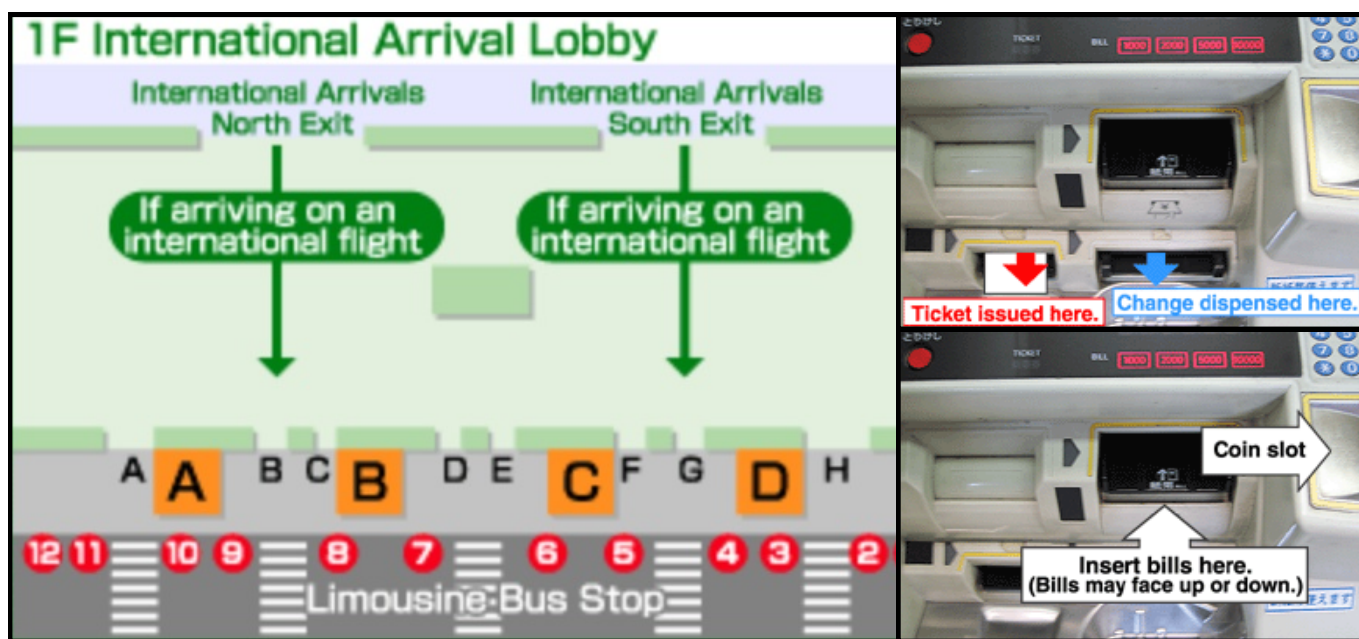

## Getting to the JEMUN 2018 Conference at Kindai University

JEMUN recommends that all participants, advisors and guests use KINTETSU NAGASE STATION as the arrival point as there is less traffic and it is the closest station to Kindai University. For your convenience, student volunteers will be at KINTETSU NAGASE STATION between 9:00 and 9:45 to lead you to the registration desk.

### If you are coming straight from Kansai International Airport

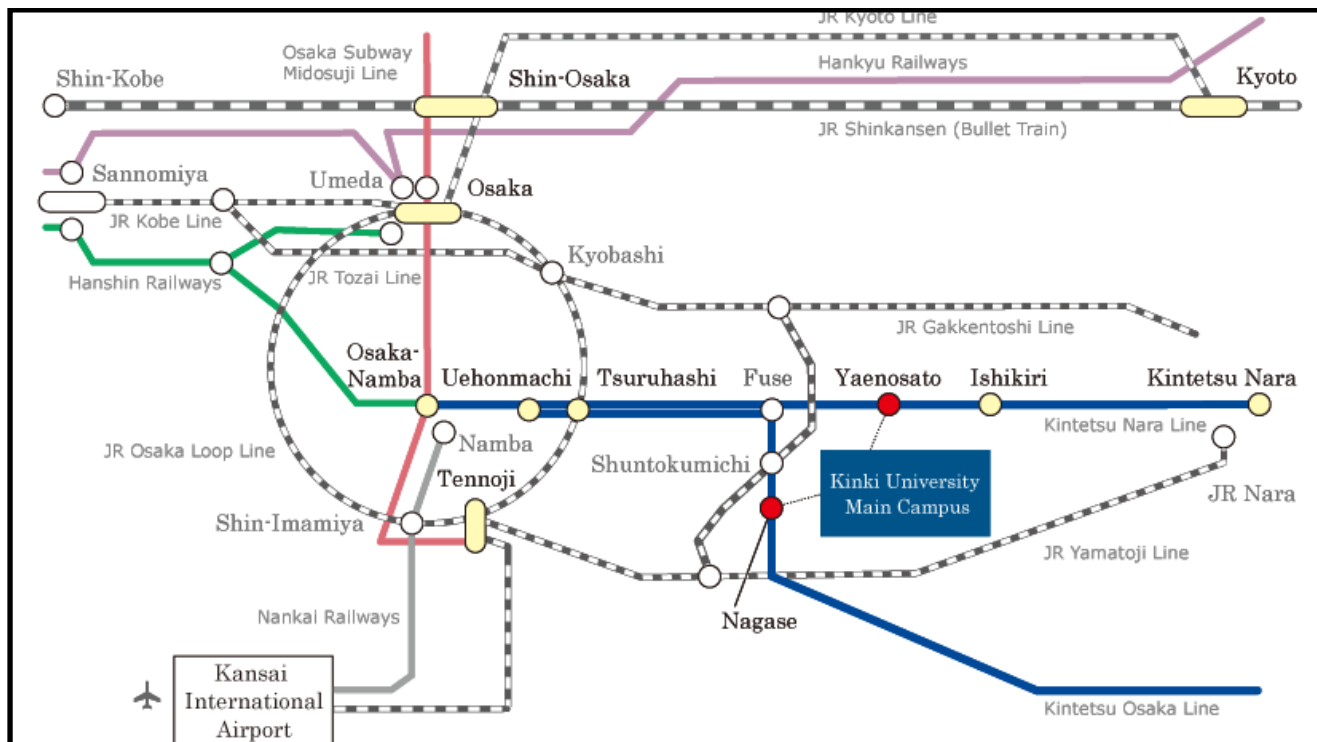
JEMUN recommends using the Kansai Airport Limousine Service from Kansai International Airport to the Sheraton Miyako Hotel Osaka (the JEMUN Conference Hotel). This bus ride will take 50 to 80 minutes depending on the traffic and will cost ¥1,550 one-way or ¥2,800 for a round-trip ticket if you plan on using this limousine service to return to the airport after the JEMUN conference. Bus tickets can be purchased from vending machines near bus stop #7 at the Kansai International Airport.



Once you arrive at the Sheraton Miyako Hotel Osaka bus stop, walk to the Osaka Uehonmachi Station (Kintetsu Osaka Line) (3 minutes).



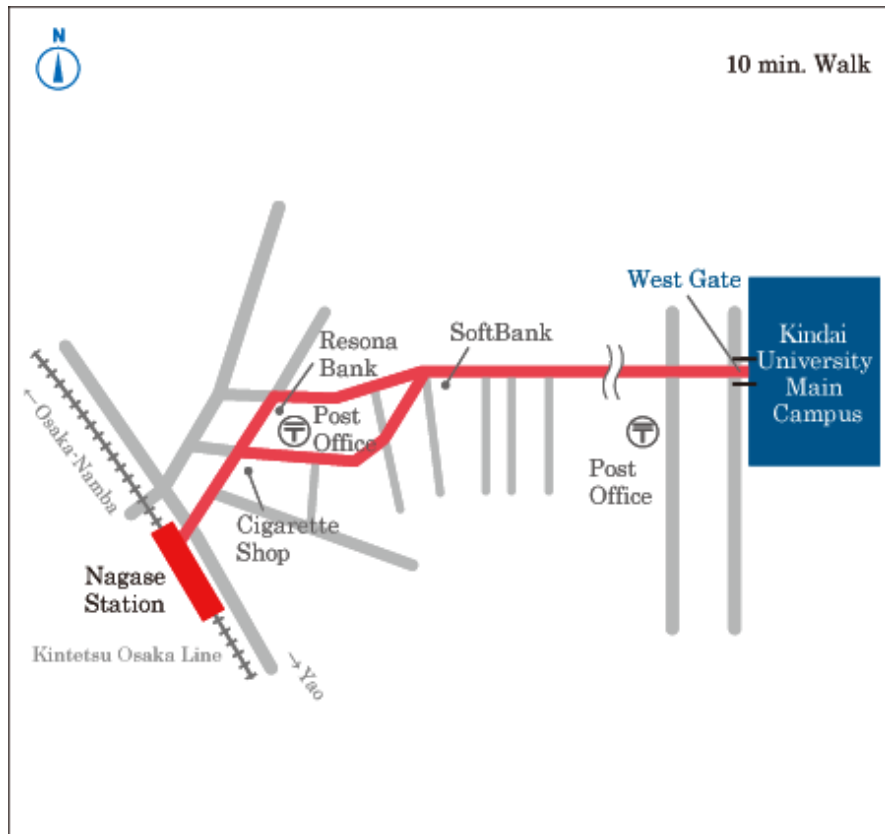
Take a local train on the Kintetsu Osaka Line from *OSAKA UEHONMACHI STATION* to *KINTETSU NAGASE STATION*. This will cost ¥260 and take 11 minutes (5 stops).



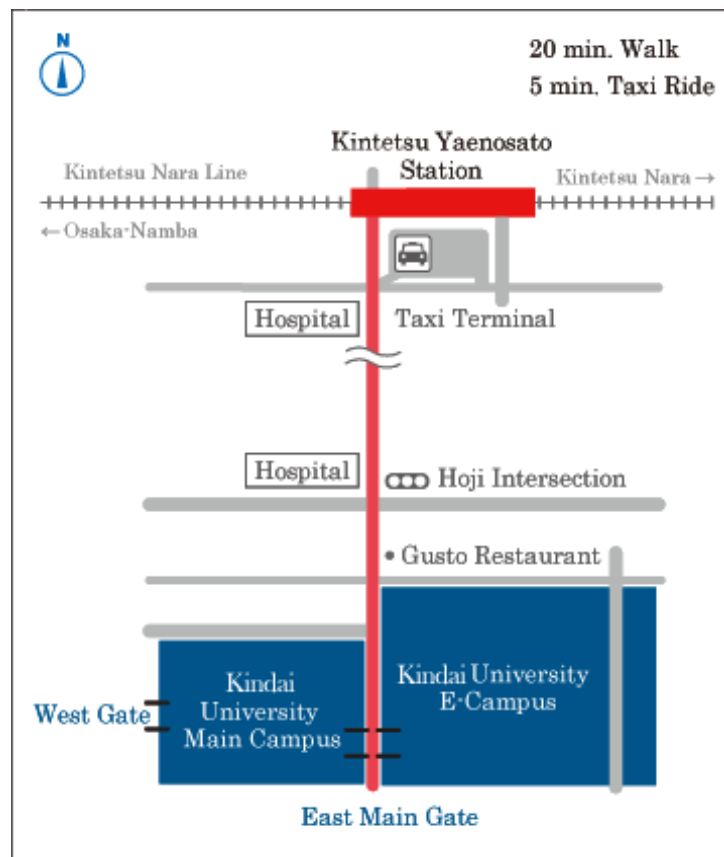

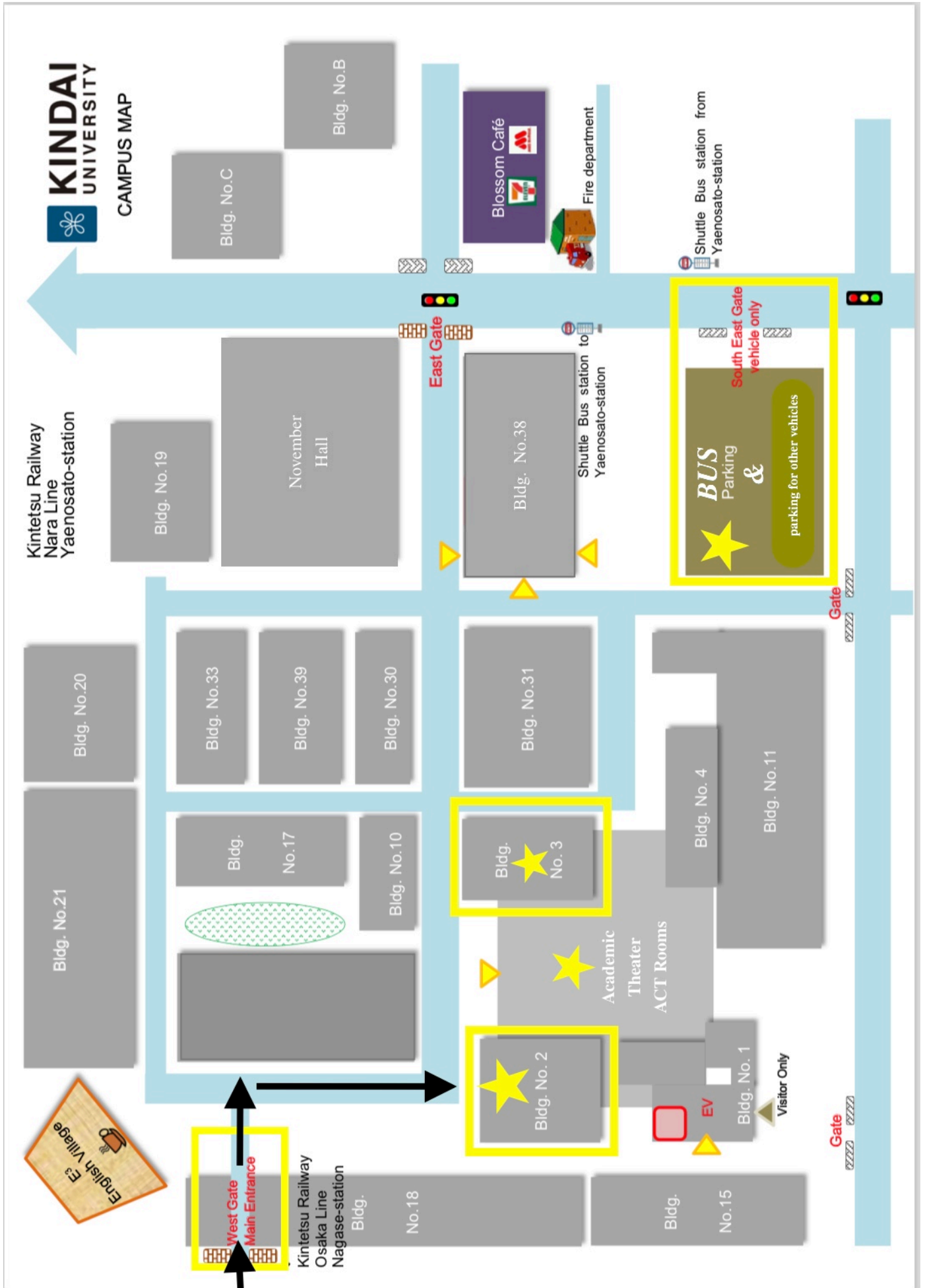



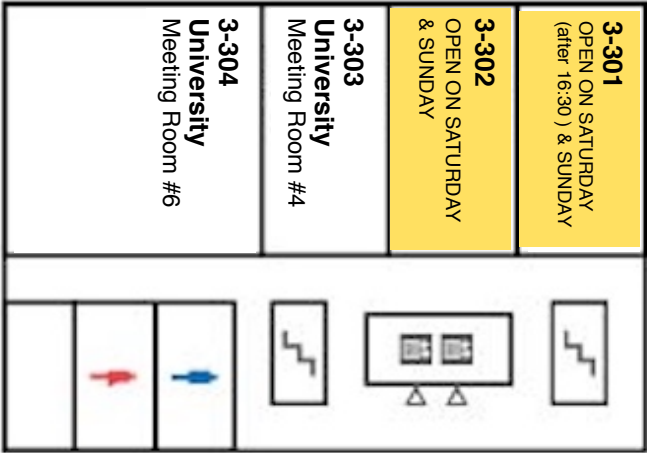

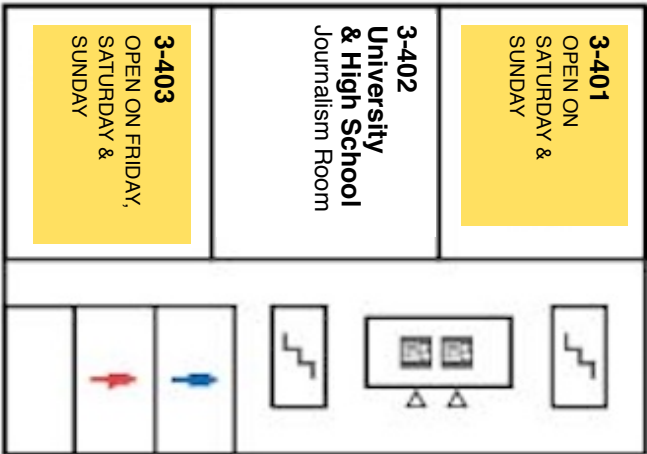


**Map of the Meeting Rooms in Building #3**

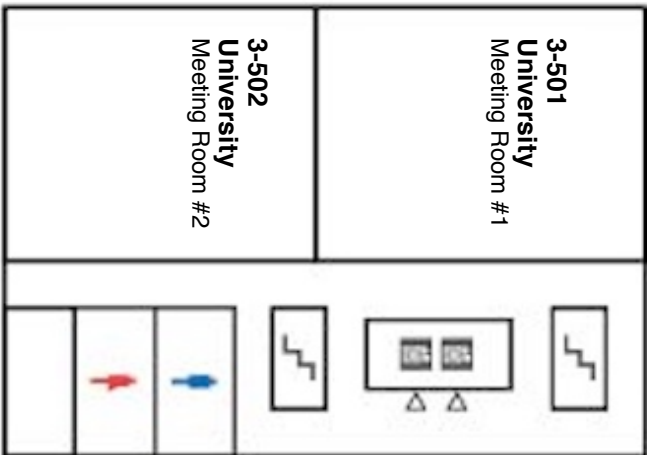

## About Kindai University

Kindai University was founded in 1949. Now one of Japan's largest universities, it has six campuses in western Japan and boasts research facilities across the nation; from Hokkaido in the north to Kagoshima in the south. Currently, Kindai university comprises 14 faculties with 48 departments, 11 graduate schools, a law school, 18 research facilities, two junior colleges, 18 associated primary and secondary schools, and two teaching hospitals. The university has over 33,000 students and more than 520,000 alumni.

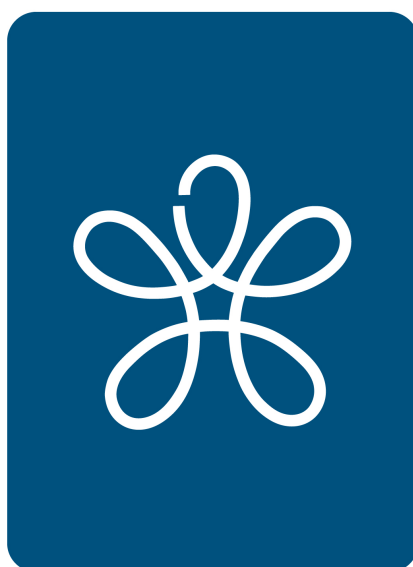
Kindai University conducts research in a wide range of fields and is making a name for itself as a leader in aquaculture, most notably for its work with bluefin tuna. Dedicated to meeting the needs of today's rapidly changing society, Kindai University will continue expanding its educational programs and facilities.

### *Our Name*

The name "Kinki" refers to the region in western Japan where our university is located. The Kinki region covers seven prefectures and includes the cities of Kyoto, Kobe, Osaka, Wakayama, and Nara. The university is informally known as "Kindai," a name formed by combining kin from Kinki with dai from daigaku, the Japanese word for university. In April 2016, "Kindai University" became the official English name for Kinki University, and a unique faculty of international studies was launched—moves that will further the university's aims of broadening its global profile.

### *Our Logo*

The Kindai University logo represents the flower of the Japanese plum tree, the first flower to blossom after Japan's long, cold winter. The flower's five petals resemble both the shape of a person and the Japanese kanji character 大学(dai), the first character in 大学(daigaku). There is a small gap in one of the pedals indicating that the university's goals are not yet fully realized and that there is still potential for improvement and development.



## **MUN, JEMUN and JEMUN Journalism**

### **What is Model United Nations (MUN)?**

MUN is an academic simulation of the United Nations that includes debate, public speaking and international affairs. At an MUN conference, participants, who are referred to as delegates, are given the opportunity to represent different countries on different committees. Delegates participate in discussions on issues ranging from world conflict and international security, to human rights and education. Through these exchanges, delegates are able to develop and refine skills such as collaboration, decision-making, critical thinking and verbal communication.

During a conference, delegates work together to create practical and innovative solutions to the issue they are discussing. These solutions are then incorporated into a plan called a working paper and then introduced to all of the delegates in the form of a draft resolution. The draft resolutions are then amended and voted on, in hopes of passing and becoming a resolution. While most MUN conferences only last a few days, delegates often leave more interested in international affairs, become more aware, more educated and more thoughtful citizens of the future.

### **About JEMUN**

*Japan English Model United Nations*, commonly referred to as *JEMUN*, is an annual faculty-organized conference held at Kindai University. JEMUN aims to be Japan's premier English MUN experience for university and high school students from around the world. JEMUN participants will come from places near and far bringing an amazing array of backgrounds and perspectives, resulting in an exciting, engaging, and unforgettable simulation. Our 2018 conference will bring together 340 students from 41 different universities and high schools.

Each JEMUN agenda is chosen after careful extensive deliberation and discussion by the faculty advisors. These chosen agendas are always issues of great importance to the world that need to be addressed with comprehensive and innovative solutions. At each JEMUN conference, participants experience cooperative hands-on learning, allowing them to confront an issue in English from the perspective of their assigned country. Through these experiences, participants develop an appreciation of differing viewpoints, the frustration of negotiation, the rewards of cooperation, and a broader view of the human side of international relations and diplomacy. The dedicated conference support and guidance from JEMUN faculty advisors and volunteers as well as the knowledge and experience shared by the invited speakers, will truly make this year's JEMUN conference a professional and educational experience of the highest quality.

### **JEMUN JOURNALISM**

JEMUN Journalism is an innovative multicultural, multi-format digital journalism simulation for high school and university students. Multicultural journalist pairs, each comprised of one Japanese student and one international student, are assigned to cover one of the JEMUN meeting rooms. Each pair collaborates, explores, engages and finally creates digital media broadcasts in one of the eight JEMUN digital journalism roles. All of the communication between each multicultural journalist pair is in English and the published news they produce are also in English.

### Plenary Speaker



**Dr. Tomohiko Sugishita**

Dr. Tomohiko Sugishita is a health systems specialist, currently working for Tokyo Women's Medical University as a Professor and the Chair of the Department of International Affairs and Tropical Medicine. He holds a Doctor of Medicine from Tohoku University, Master of Public Health from Harvard School of Public Health, Master of Arts in Medical Anthropology from the University of London and a Doctor of Philosophy from Great Lakes University of Kisumu in Kenya. He is specialized in cardiovascular surgery, global public health and medical anthropology. Since 1995, he has been working extensively on strengthening national and local health systems in more than 30 countries, mainly in Africa. He also contributed the establishment of the framework on the Sustainable Development Goals and Universal Health Coverage, adopted by the United Nations Special Assembly in 2015. He recently received the Social Business Grand Prix in 2014 and the Honorable Award for Distinguished Medical Services in 2016.

## Meeting Room #2 Speaker



**Dr. Tadashi Yasuda**

Dr. Yasuda is an expert on global health, who has worked extensively in developing countries in Asia and Africa. As a medical doctor, he specialized in surgery aiming to serve those who do not have access to medical care. However, experience in developing countries and refugee camps made him realize that social and lifestyle conditions including access to health care have dominant roles to play for the health of people and that clinical management alone has quite a limited impact in solving the problems. He studied public health and shifted his career from a surgeon to a public health practitioner. With JICA (Japanese ODA), World Health Organization and United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), he worked for the prevention of HIV/AIDS and introduction of antiretroviral treatment, especially for mothers and children. After joining UNICEF, his responsibility was to improve the Maternal and Child Health and Nutrition, especially among the most vulnerable and disadvantaged communities in various countries in Asia and Africa. Since 2017, he has worked at Kindai University to accelerate the university's social contribution both domestically and internationally in the health sector. He holds Doctor of Medicine and PhD from Osaka University and Master of Public Health from The Johns Hopkins School of Hygiene and Public Health.

Natsuko Takenaka , Country Representative, Uganda Programme, has been working for Peace Winds Japan (PWJ), one of the leading humanitarian NGOs in Japan, since 2015. She started working as a program coordinator at the PWJ headquarters and during this time she was in charge of programs for Nepal, South Sudan, and Kenya. In 2016, she moved from the PWJ headquarters to the field in order to launch the Uganda program in response to the massive influx of refugees from South Sudan. Natsuko holds an MA in International Law, and also completed her course work for a doctoral program in International Law at Chuo University.

**Mr. Masaki Inaba**

Masaki Inaba has been working to mobilize and coordinate civil society advocacy movement to achieve SDGs in Japan and worldwide. Currently, he is the Executive Director of Japan Civil Society Network (SDGs Japan), which is the Japanese civil society coalition to organize advocacy and public campaign to achieve SDGs with more than 80 membership organizations working on poverty and inequality, local revitalization, environment and international cooperation. He led the process of civil society advocacy for the Voluntary National Review (VNR) of Japan in High Level Political Forum (HLPF) 2017. He is also a member representing civil society in Japan's SDGs Promotion Round Table, which is Japan's official multi-stakeholder mechanism to achieve SDGs. Before establishing SDGs Japan, he served the executive director of Global Call to Action against Poverty (GCAP) Japan for 7 years since its establishment. In parallel, he served program director on global health in Africa Japan Forum (AJF), another Japanese civil society organization working on African issues since 2002. Before joining AJF, he was a gay activist working on rights and equality of lesbian and gay issues in Japan as the Vice President in charge of advocacy in Japan Association for the Lesbian and Gay Movement (OCCUR). His career of a civil society activist started from day-workers labor and health movement in the day workers community in Kotobuki-Cho, a day-workers district in Yokohama City, near Tokyo, from 1990.

## Meeting Room #5 Speaker



**Dr. Jun Kobayashi**

Prof. Dr. Kobayashi has more than 20 years' experience in global health and is the author of more than 90 publications in international scientific journals. He has made contribution in strengthening the capacity of infectious disease control and school health in low and middle income countries under the Japanese Official Development Assistance (ODA) program with a point of views both of a practitioner and a researcher. He received 3rd merit of labor from the Lao government in 1999 for making contribution in malaria control. From 2000, he had joined the core member of Hashimoto Initiative, mentioning the importance of deworming and other infectious disease program in school. He made numerous contributions in the human resource development for policy management in Asia and African countries. He has been a chair of Japan consortium for global school health research (JC-GSHR), a think-tank and the focal point of Japan for global promotion of school health, since its inception in 2008.

He is currently head of Department of Global Health, School of Health Sciences, University of the Ryukyus, which is 2nd oldest school of health sciences in Japan, since 2012. He is the program leader of Okinawa Global Health Program in this school, which was newly founded in October 2015 to promote human resource development contributing in the public health issue in the region. He has started the research project for combating vector borne diseases and zoonosis as a project leader supported by Okinawa prefecture's government.

For his research in school health based disease control, which helped decreasing malaria incidence in Southeast Asia, he received "the Zero Malaria Award" from No More Malaria Japan in 2016 and "Aikawa Masamichi Award" from Japanese Society of Tropical Medicine in 2017. His contribution in the practice of global health, such as promoting the school health in developing countries and assisting to Myanmar migrant, was granted with the encourage award from Ooyama foundation in 2013.

## Meeting Room #6 Speaker



**Dr. Sayaka Horiuchi**

Dr. Sayaka Horiuchi has worked as a physician, a public health advisor and a researcher mainly in Japan and Lao PDR: first as a pediatrician, then as a public health advisor of the Project for Strengthening Integrated Maternal, Neonatal and Child Health Services in Lao PDR under the contract of the JICA (Japanese International Cooperation Agency) and a consultant on maternal, neonatal and child health at the WHO (World Health Organization) Lao Country Office, and as an assistant professor at the Teikyo University Graduate School of Public Health.

During her clinical work at the National Center for Child Health and Development in Japan, she got interested in promotion of healthy behavior because she figured out that lots of people came to a hospital after their disease severely exacerbated. She realized an importance of preventive actions and founded a voluntary group to provide health education for children and their parents and to encourage their healthy behavior.

After five years of clinical work, she became an advisor for community health/Maternal and Child Health of the JICA project in Lao PDR. At the project, she worked on capacity development of governmental officials at public health departments in sub-national levels to improve health status of mothers and children in the country. She provided strategic advice for health officials on integration of MNCH services and on expansion of the MNCH service coverage. She applied systematic approach and focused on improvement in a cycle of planning/budgeting, implementation, monitoring and evaluation. The project was completed with great success; the MNCH service coverage increased during the project period.

After her experience in the field, she wanted gain skills that enabled her to scientifically analyze her activities in the field and decided to study at the London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine. She took the degree of Master of Epidemiology there in 2016. Afterward, she was assigned to a consultant on MNCH at the WHO country office in Lao PDR for six months. She was involved in revising the national strategy on MNCH and drafting an essential service package that was later fed into the national health insurance scheme of Lao PDR.

That experience motivated her to further brush up her expertise, and she decided to study in the Doctor of Public Health at the Teikyo University of Graduate School of Public Health. She majors in public health policy and currently leads a research on evaluation of effective quality improvement system for newborn care in low- and middle-income countries. She also works at the school as a faculty member, an assistant professor, and teaches global health to under and post graduate students.

## JEMUN Journalism Speaker



**Mr. Jay Hartwell**

Jay Hartwell has been a journalism and communications professional in Hawai'i for 35 years: first as a reporter for the morning daily newspaper, then as the author of the state's 1996 Book of the Year on the modern native Hawaiian community and a communications officer for the Honolulu City Council, and for the past 19 years as the award-winning faculty adviser to student-led media programs at the University of Hawai'i.

As a reporter, he initiated investigations of homelessness, tourism fraud and racism in a state that is considered the melting pot of the United States. He wanted more challenges as a journalist and writer and sought a fellowship that enabled him to leave the newspaper and examine in a book how Hawaiians are perpetuating their traditional culture. Later, he learned about public relations and marketing when he served the chair of Honolulu's city council and then assisted with his mayoral campaign.

At the University, he has trained many of the state's current reporters and public relations executives. He helps advise a student-led news program that produces a newspaper, website and social media ([@kaleo.org](http://kaleo.org)); a production unit that does commercial, feature, and documentary videos (<https://www.youtube.com/user/uhFILMproductions>); a literary journal that produces two volumes a year ([hawaiiireview.org](http://hawaiiireview.org)); and a 24-7-365 FM radio station that broadcasts at 7,000 watts throughout Honolulu and via cablecast and live streaming ([ktuh.org](http://ktuh.org)).

He supports the state's high school media programs with annual training and a competition that culminates in an awards banquet that recognizes the state's best work by high school journalists. All of that work led to his nomination to and selection for the College Media Association's outstanding service award.

In 2013-2014, he took a professional leave to serve as a U.S. Fulbright Core Scholar in Vietnam, where he conducted journalism workshops for professionals and university students.

That experience led to explorations of journalism education in Asia with 2015, 2016 and 2017 summer visits to and workshops for professional associations and universities in Hong Kong, Singapore, Korea, Japan and Vietnam. In December, the Hawaii Publishers Association elected him president of the nonprofit organization that represents the state's large and small printers and publishers.

## ***JEMUN 2018 Conference Hotel: Sheraton Miyako Uehonmachi Osaka***

### **About the Hotel**

The Sheraton Miyako Uehonmachi Osaka is perfectly situated away from the bustle of the city, while still in downtown Osaka. It is close to local attractions, the old city, and shopping centers. The neighborhood surrounding the hotel, is filled with temples, shrines, and historical sites dating back to the 7th century. The magnificent Osaka Castle, the city landmark originally built by Toyotomi Hideyoshi five centuries ago, is just a brief walk from the hotel.

Every 20 to 30 minutes, door-to-door limousine bus service connects the hotel with Kansai International Airport and Itami domestic airport. The adjacent railway station and the subway stop provide easy access to all parts of the city as well as Nara and Kyoto.

### **Hotel Room Features**

All of the rooms are equipped with a TV, air conditioner, refrigerator, coffee and tea maker, hair dryer, in-room safe, toilet, shower, bath, and an alarm clock. If you need an ironing board and an iron, you can call housekeeping and ask them to bring them to your room. All rooms have access to free WiFi.

## JEMUN Policies and Conference Information

### JEMUN Code of Conduct

Delegates and journalists are responsible to act, speak and appear professional and diplomatic; treating others with respect and courtesy. JEMUN does not tolerate discrimination based on disability, age, religion, national origin, sexual orientation, gender, color or race. Delegates are expected to attend all sessions and ceremonies and stay in character representing the policies and interests of their assigned country or journalist role. Clothing must be professional. Western business dress is preferred and traditional dress is only allowed for delegates whose native countries wear traditional cultural dress professionally. It is expected that all delegates will respect the property of the hosting university and hotel. Smoking is allowed only in designated areas on campus and not allowed in the hotel rooms. The legal drinking age in Japan is 20 and alcohol is not allowed on campus.

### Registration and Bag Storage

Registration will take place on the first floor of Building 2 starting from 9 am on Friday, June 22nd. For directions to Building 2 please refer to the campus map on page 7. At the registration desk, you will receive a name tag and a JEMUN conference handbook. The volunteer staff will direct you to the storage area for your bags and suitcases.

### Meeting Rooms

Meeting rooms 1, 2 and 6 will have a Chair, Director, Assistant Director and Rapporteur. They are referred to as the Bureau. If you are unsure about the rules, feel free to ask the Bureau during informal informal debate or in formal debate by raising a point of inquiry. *Volunteer Pages* will be available throughout the conference to deliver your messages to other delegates or the Bureau. There will be Faculty Advisors in each meeting room who will offer support during the meeting. Delegates can ask them questions about the rules of procedure.

## **JEMUN Shuttle Bus Service**

JEMUN participants staying at the conference hotel will have bus service to and from the Sheraton Miyako Uehonmachi Osaka hotel. On Friday and Saturday evening, the buses will depart at 20:15 from the Kindai University parking area shown on page 7. At the end of the day, take all of your own personal electronic devices and other belongings to the hotel. You must pick-up your luggage before getting on the bus on Friday the 22nd and bring your luggage with you when checking out of the hotel on Sunday the 24th. All of the JEMUN participants have been assigned to one of the conference shuttle buses and a student bus leader will be checking to see that you are on the correct bus. ## **JEMUN Speakers' list**

Once the speakers' list has been opened and the time limit on speeches has been set, 15 delegates need to speak before a motion can be made. The speaking order is set for the delegates' first speech. Thereafter, a note needs to be sent to the Bureau to add or remove your country's name from the speakers' list.

## **Specialized Committees at JEMUN**

At JEMUN, delegates in meeting rooms 1,2, and 6 are assigned to one of 4 or 5 specialized committees in their meeting room. In each committee, approximately 12 students will work together to co-write a working paper. As the groups are large and have equal representation from all of the regions, sponsors and signatories are not required when tabling draft resolutions.

## **Guest Speakers' Q&A Sessions-Committee Representatives**

One member from each specialized committee and selected journalists will meet with the guest speakers on Saturday morning in a semi-private one hour Q&A session after their speeches. On Friday, please decide on one committee representative who will join this Q&A session and ask questions to the invited speaker on behalf of your committee.

## **Writing Working Papers**

At JEMUN, delegates cannot submit clauses or working papers (WPs) to their committee that were written before the conference. WPs are to be debated by all committee members in the spirit of cooperation and inclusion representing the diverse country and regional needs. Language proficiency, gender, or national background divisions should not be visible to those observing the group. The template for a draft resolution will be on each committee's USB memory stick. Committee WPs must be submitted to the Bureau by 4:50 pm on Saturday the 23rd.

5. **Informal Informal Debate (Regional Bloc)** – "(Country) would like to suspend the meeting for \_\_\_\_\_ minutes to go into INFORMAL INFORMAL DEBATE in our regional blocs to (*purpose*)."
6. **Suspend the Meeting (Break/Lunch)** – "(Country) would like to suspend the meeting for \_\_\_\_\_ minutes/until tomorrow to (*purpose*)"

3. **Replace within a clause**– On behalf of (Regional Bloc), (Country) would like to introduce an amendment to replace (*actual word/phrase/section*) with (\_\_\_\_\_) in operative clause #\_\_\_\_, so that it reads (full clause reading).
4. **Replace an entire operative clause**– On behalf of (Regional Bloc), (Country) would like to introduce an amendment to replace operative clause #\_\_\_\_ with an alternative clause, that reads (full clause reading).
5. **Delete an entire operative clause**– On behalf of (Regional Bloc), (Country) would like to introduce an amendment to delete operative clause #\_\_\_\_.
